Antique Ndula to Convert to a Museum



he Schools' Green Initiative Challenge is a unique project implemented by KenGen Foundation in partnership with Better Globe Forestry and Bamburi Cement Ltd.

The main objective is the greening of over 460 acres in the semi-arid counties of Embu, Kitui and Machakos with Mukau (*M. Volkensii*) and Muveshi (*S. Siamea*) tree species as a way of mitigating climate change and providing wood fuel and alternative income opportunities for the local communities.

Through the setting up of woodlots in participating schools, the project acts as a change agent to establish a tree-planting culture for multiple benefits in dry-land areas.

The ten-year project is designed as a competition amongst the participating institutions for the highest seedling survival rates through the application of various innovations at the schools' woodlots.

Currently, there are 219 schools from the three counties taking part in the afforestation contest for the ultimate prize of educational trips, scholarship opportunities, and other prizes. Plans are underway to add more schools in the coming years.

The afforestation competition is in line with the Government of Kenya's Vision 2030 to achieve 10% forest cover across the country.

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Word from the Managing Trustee

Dear Reader,

Welcome to this year's first issue of the Giver Newsletter. It has been quite a busy period since the beginning of the year as we continued focusing on our regular programs while at the same time taking on new ones.

We recently launched Phase III of our flagship environment program, the Schools' Green Initiative Challenge at Tulimyumbu Primary School, Machakos when we welcomed 99 new schools from the semi-arid areas of the counties of Embu, Kitui and Machakos to the afforestation challenge. I'm delighted to note the enthusiasm shown by the 'green' teachers and school heads on this program is enormous. Together with the on-going Phase II and the concluded Phase1, a total of 319 schools are now engaged in the afforestation activity.

A total of 160 secondary school and university students attended the four-day Annual Mentorship and Education Scholarship Awards held in April at Starehe Boys Centre. This year's mentorship had to be held in April due to the general elections, which will be held in August. Twenty-three secondary school students and twenty-five university students were awarded KenGen Education Scholarships this year.

Currently, the Company is supporting 90 university students and 91 secondary students, with 8 beneficiaries being sponsored by contributions from the KenGen Employee Giver Initiative, and two from our project partner, Bamburi Cement Ltd.

The Foundation has expanded its scope in terms of partnerships by recently signing Memorandum of Understanding with the National Museums of Kenya to convert the antique Ndula Power Station into a museum. The historic station will be the first ever electricity production museum in East Africa.

The Foundation is currently facilitating Better Globe Forestry Ltd. set up an in-vitro laboratory for the propagation of the Mukau tree species next to Kamburu, power station. The project is line with the company's objective of contributing towards climate change mitigation by promoting tree planting through agro-forestry.

I would also like to highlight the refurbishment of Kiambaa Primary School and the construction of the Mirira Footpath under the World Bank Community Development Carbon Fund grant. The two projects are near completion and the students and Upper Tana community are already enjoying the new facilities.

I am glad to report that the Giver Initiative has continued to grow and during a new member recruitment campaign in the last two months, more than 100 new members joined in. The total number of KenGen Givers currently is 860. We hope to hit 1000 members by the time we complete the campaign in the all areas within the next coming weeks.

Lastly I would like to highlight the Megawatt Café, which opened in January at the KenGen Pension Plaza 2. The café is the first social investments undertaken by the Foundation. All profits generated by the Café will be channeled back to our core programs. With a classy and elegant ambience, the café offers a diverse menu and is open from 7 a.m – 5 p.m. Monday to Friday. We can't thank more the Central Office staff who have patronized the café from the first day it opened

GIC Expansion Project Enters Phase III with 99 New Schools

inty nine new schools joined the Schools' Green Initiative Challenge Expansion Project during the launch of Phase III of the afforestation competition at a colorful ceremony held at Tulimyumbu Primary School, Machakos County on 5 May. This bring to 219 the number of schools currently involved in the tree-planting project implemented

by the KenGen Foundation in partnership with Better Globe Forestry and Bamburi Cement limited

The event, hosted by the KenGen Foundation, was graced by the presence of KenGen's Chairman of the Board of Directors Mr. Joshua Choge, and the Acting KenGen MD Eng. David Muthike. Also

present were KenGen Eastern Hydros Operations Manager Eng. Francis Kawa; KenGen Business Development Director Moses Wekesa; KenGen Foundation's Managing Trustee Mike Njeru; the Managing Director Better Globe Forestry Ltd., Jean-Paul Deprins' and the Director of Corporate Communications Affairs, and Sustainable Development Susan

Maingi of Bamburi Cement Ltd. Mr. Joshua Choge, the chief guest, noted that through the GIC, the Foundation and partners invest more than 10 million annually since the program started in 2013 for a worthy cause, with the results

witnessed at Tulimyumbu attesting

to this.

"We're all witnesses to the effects of wanton environmental destruction through logging, illegal charcoal burning, and other such activities that have laid waste many parts of our beautiful country and now threaten the livelihoods of both current and future generations", he said.

"Each one of us has a duty to stop this. The task of environmental conservation cannot be left as the sole responsibility of a single or a number of institutions but that of every citizen whether individual or corporate," he added.

Tulimyumbu is one of the 120 school involved in Phase II of the GIC. Under the project, 500 acres of arid and semi-arid land in the counties of Embu, Machakos, and Kitui are set to go green in the ambitious ten-year schools afforestation project.

The Green Initiative Challenge expansion project involves schools in growing woodlots within their compounds with the drought resistant Muveshi and Mukau tree species. Pawpaw and Passion fruit trees have recently been introduced.

Welcoming the new schools, the acting MD David Muthike noted that, "as we launch Phase III of the tree-planting competition, it is imperative for us as KenGen to continue working with all stakeholders to achieve the targeted 10% forest cover in Kenya's Vision 2030".

The GIC Expansion is a 10-year project funded by the partners at a cost of Ksh 120 million and is an upscale of the successful Phase I pilot project that initially involved 81 schools within the counties of Embu and Machakos.

The project is designed as a challenge to participating schools, mainly due to the dry weather conditions in the areas. Prizes are awarded based on the highest survival rate of seedlings and use of innovation in growing the trees.

"Personal commitment to the project is crucial for the success of the project at any given school", stressed Mike Njeru, Managing Trustee KenGen Foundation. "Our experience has shown that the inclusion of the schools' administration in the GIC gives a school a higher chance of success as compared to when they are not involved", he added.

The MD of Better Globe Forestry noted Iean-Paul Deprins challenges environmental the project area and wished the new entrant all the best in the competition. The company supports the Green Initiative Challenge expansion project through the provision of tree seedlings, monitoring and evaluation equipment, and capacity building activities.

Susan Maingi of Bamburi Cement Ltd. pledged that the company will continue in supporting the project, not only in tree-planting, but also in infrastructure development and the awarding of education scholarships. The cement manufacturer will also arrange environmental education trips and sessions for the best performing schools

The schools Green Initiative Challenge expansion project targets to reach 140,000 school children by 2018, with the schools being used as channels to reach out to the wider community members and encourage tree planting and nurturing. So far, more than 90,000 seedlings have been planted in Phase II of the tree-planting competition.

New 'Green' Teachers Trained for GIC Phase III



hundred and ninety eight teachers, including head teachers and principals from 90 schools in the semiarid areas of Embu, Machakos and Kitui counties underwent a capacity building exercise from 1-3 March in preparation of their taking part in phase III of the Schools' Green Initiative Challenge program

Globe Forestry, Bamburi Cement, National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) and Kenya Forest Service (KFS) aimed to equip the new 'Green Teachers' and school heads with the necessary skills and information on how to participate and manage the afforestation competition.

KenGen Foundation Senior Programs Officer Anthony Igecha says the inclusion in the training of the schools' head teachers during Phase III of the afforestation competition is crucial for the successful implementation of the project.

"The schools administration need to own the project right from the beginning. This will ensure that the students get full support, and also guarantee the allocation of necessary resources for the project," said Igecha.

The teachers were coached on the various characteristics of the GIC including the benefits and challenges of growing the tree and fruit species in the program.

The Green Teachers also learnt various nursery management practices, including weeding, seed propagation, pest and disease control, and best practices in sustainable water harvesting.

Currently 120 schools from the three counties are engaged in phase II of the GIC, with additional schools scheduled to be added to the competition annually.

Antique Ndula to Convert to a Museum

Ndula hydro-power station is set to become the first electric power museum in East Africa following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between KenGen, KenGen Foundation, and the National Museums of Kenya. The gazzetement of the station as a national heritage site is almost complete.

The 2-Megawatt station commissioned in 1903 and situated in Gatuanyaga division in Kiambu County 20 kilometres from Thika town was decommissioned by the Company in December 2010 due to operational challenges.

Speaking during the MoU signing held at the KenGen offices on 8 March, KenGen MD and CEO Eng. Albert Mugo said the decision to convert Ndula into a museum was made after the company ascertained the hydo-power plant had become economically unviable to redevelop for purposes of power generation.

"Last year, KenGen's Board of Directors approved a proposal from KenGen Foundation to have the station gazetted and converted into a national museum to keep in perpetuity the country's evolution

of electric power production and industrial development," he said

KenGen Foundation will spearhead the conversion process as well as take charge of the running of the museum and other support facilities once the process is complete.

According to the MoU, the conversion process will entail conservation and management of the country's heritage of electricity

generation and conversion of Ndula Power station into a museum. This will involve research, documentation, construction of necessary facilities, fabrication and curation of exhibition materials and preservation of the site and existing equipment.

"It will also involve the establishment of opportunities for education and training in heritage conservation and management as well as staff exchange and

collaboration through training programs and workshops with special interest in evolution of power generation," said Eng. Mugo.

The Director General, National Museums of Kenya, Dr. Mzalendo Kibunjia, said the museum will play a huge role in developing the country's rich heritage by increasing the number of museums offering diverse information for research, information and education.

"The hydro-power plant and its associate external components like

the dam, Thika River and the water falls, which will form the basic display areas will be preserved with minimal changes so as to present them in the most authentic manner," said Dr. Kibunjia.

"For the Foundation, this is like preserving a family jewel" said Managing Trustee, Mike Njeru adding that the creation of the museum will drastically cut on the influx of students and members of the public who seek to visit the Company's power stations on a daily basis.

"The museum will offer a better learning environment for those seeking to know more about electric power generation, complete with a historic touch", he said.

enya's arid and semi-arid areas are set to benefit in agro-forestry resources once an In-Vitro multiplication laboratory for Mukau tree is set up at Kamburu area in Machakos County.

The project is set to kick off following the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between KenGen, KenGen Foundation, and Better Globe Forestry who are the executors of the facility.

The in-vitro laboratory will be set-up on KenGen's 40 hectares of land near Kamburu power station which will be leased to Better Globe Forestry through the company's corporate social responsibility wing, KenGen Foundation. The facility will enable scientific propagation of thousands of Mukau seedlings which will be distributed to farmers in ASAL areas for agroforesty and forestry plantations.

Speaking during the signing the MoU on March 8, 2016, KenGen MD and CEO Eng. Albert Mugo said through the project, the company aims at contributing towards climate change mitigation by promoting tree planting through agroforestry. He said the facility will enhance capacity building and exchange of academic knowledge between project partners to enable the establishment highly valuable commercial trees in dry lands. The project will be developed in two phases, starting with a laboratory, a trial farm for framers, offices, a green-house and nursery, and an educational exchange program.

The second phase will involve the development of a log yard, a saw mill, workshops and fuel stations, a timber processing industry and warehouses. This will be geared towards processing timber bought from households engaged in *Melia Volkensii* plantations.

Known as the 'mahogany' of the dry land, the *Mukau* tree, botanically known as *Melia volkensii* takes between 15 to 20 years to mature and produces first class hard wood timber. Its propagation among rural households in ASAL areas will bring development of profitable

and sustainable agro-forestry and commercial forestry enterprises in these areas.

The Managing Director of
Better Globe Forestry Limited
Mr. Jean-Paul Deprins said the
multiplication facility and planned
timber processing industry
will enhance participation of
rural households in commercial
forestry, as a complementary
income generation activity.

"We are excited to see the start of this project which has a high commercial value for thousands of households in dry rural areas who never dreamed of growing a commercially viable tree in their land", said Mr. Deprins.

The *Melia Volkensii* in-vitro multiplication facility is a project run by Better Globe Forestry in collaboration with the University of Ghent in Belgium, the University of Nairobi, and the Kenya Forestry Research Institute (KEFRI). The project is funded by the Belgian Flemish Government and the Foundation will hold the Company's interests in its operations.

The Managing Trustee noted that the contributions from Givers had managed to raise over Ksh. 4 million which will go a long way in expanding projects under the Foundation's three main pillars namely Education, Environment, Water & Sanitation. "Currently, we have 8 students benefitting through scholarships funded by the initiative", he added.

Mr. Njeru encouraged the Givers to recruit their friends and colleagues who are not vet subscribed. Central Office Givers have been actively involved in the company's Corporate Social Investment activities through the Foundation and its partners. Last year, the Nairobi Givers managed to plant over 1,000 trees at Nairobi National Park's buffer zone as part of KenGen's corporate mandate in environmental conservation. A section of the subscribers have committed themselves to the Education Program as mentors.

he scorching sun did not deter KenGen Western Hydros staff, Givers, and community members from Nyakach Sub-county from planting over 1,000 trees at Katuk-Odeyo as part of the KenGen's Corporate Social Investment activities on March 30.

Led by Sondu Miriu's Operations Manager Frank Konuche, and the Foundation's Managing Trustee Mike Njeru, the team joined Proffessor Jack Kamiruka, staff, and students of Lake Basin College in the afforestation exercise.

"It is imperative that the community adopts a tree-planting culture to curb the negative effects of climate change and soil erosion", said Eng. Konuche.

"KenGen as a company is able and ready to provide the tree seedlings towards afforestation in the area and we will increase the number to 6,000. Hopefully one day we will also set up a tree nursery for the benefit of the community", he added.

Echoing the station chief's sentiment, Mike Njeru called upon the community and area leaders to "take it upon themselves to address environmental destruction before the situation gets worse for help".

The tree planting exercise follows an MoU signed earlier between the KenGen Foundation and the Lake Basin College that provides the framework of the cooperation between the parties in regard to the afforestation project.

An initial 3,000 seedlings was committed to 'green' the Katuk Odeyo project area, which is heavily degraded with huge gullies across the land caused by soil erosion.

The school's renovation, and the construction of the nearby footpath at Mirira are being implemented by KenGen Foundation in conjunction with KenGen's CDM and Environment Department and KenGen Upper Tana area. It is part of the company's Corporate Social Investment activity through a \$50,000 grant from the World Bank CDCE.

Speaking in the newly refurbished Head master's office, the contractor assured the team that the renovations will be completed within the given period and that the necessary requirements will be observed during the construction period.

At the Mirira footpath construction site, the team was impressed by the latest developments, which not only included guard rails at the newly constructed bridge, but also a cleared path inclusive of a calvat drain for rain water management.

Surprisingly, the chairlady of the Project Implementation Committee Ms. Agnes Kabata was also hands on deck as she worked on clearing stones on one side of the construction site!

The construction of the footpath "is a triple blessing for the women and youth of this area since they will have easier access to both sides of the river. The area youth have benefited immensely from the casual work and the opportunity to gain new skills in construction", said Eng. Williams.

The new footpath is also expected to boost the area's income generation through the ease of movement between the six villages of Kairo, Gakindu, Matithi, Kayuyu and Kaingojo and the three local markets at Makutano Town.
